### SECRETARY'S REPORT

### **1 INTRODUCTION**

This has been our second year of growing vegetables but has been the third year we have all been working together to grow food organically locally for local people. We were fortunate that we had a superb summer, an increased number of members, a small but dedicated team of workers who were able to call on a larger number of volunteers for a particular range of tasks or the Open Day and Tattie Fest. We have many people who have particular skills that we have become to rely on during the year from planning, purchasing, organising, planting, growing, harvesting, selling and generally just mucking in. The chair will cover in his report the crop and selling report which has been a huge success and I will deal with some of the boring but essential organisational details

### 2 THE ORGANISATION

We are a Scottish Charitable Incorporation Organisation (SCIO) and it is useful to reminder ourselves of our Charitable Objectives.

- To advance citizenship and community development by encouraging cooperation and mutual support to produce food organically for local consumption in a changing economic and physical environment
- To achieve this by managing a sustainable and environmentally responsible growing project for the benefit of all
- To promote education within in the community in organic food growing, care and harvest and distribution and ensure a better understanding of the connections between what we eat and how it is produced, delivered and prepared.

We still have much work to do to meet all these objectives but we see it all as a long term project which evolves in a flexible manner and allows all to learn as we go along. The constitution is available for any members who which to see it. At the present time, the Trustees meet regularly (usually once a month) to oversee activities on and off the field but we are increasingly realizing that we need to do more to involve members and volunteers and are looking at ways in which we can do this. We have had some useful suggestions and would welcome any ideas we can consider.

### **3 THE TRUSTEES**

As SCIO we are required to have trustees who are responsible for running the organization and managing its assets. From 28<sup>th</sup> September 2012 2013 there were 9 Trustees until 9th December 2012, when Jim Cockburn was co-opted and became treasurer

We have also received a grant of £250 for the website from the Community Council; this is not completed yet because of our other activities during the summer but should go live soon

We have received visits to the field from similar groups in North Edinburgh, the Postcode Lottery, the Scottish and Southern Electricity Grant coordinator and representatives of the McGarrison Society

We have made the field available for school picnics for the Royal School of Dunkeld and Craigie Primary School

We have been asked to speak about our experiences at several public meetings and conferences and have had speakers at Highland Council's conference on Community Growing in Inverness and the Mcgarrison Society AGM in Glasgow

# 7. OTHER RELEVANT ACTIVITIES

The following actions have been undertaken during 2013 and have hopefully kept us on the straight and narrow

- The lease We have signed a five year Short Limited Duration Tenancy Agreement with the Soil Association for 3.2 Acres. The rest of the field will continue to be leased to the horse owners and we would like to thank Karen, Fiona and Susanne for all support and cooperation
- The Buildings We obtained clearance from the Planning Department for 2 new sheds
- Insurances- We have taken out a number of insurances for public liability, product liability, volunteers, and capital equipment
- Risk Assessments-we have carried out a risk assessments for the visits and events
- Health and Safety we have Health and Safety Policy
- Child Protection- we have agreed and reviewed our child protection policy
- Grants and Donations We have had grants from The Griffin Wind Farm and Dunkeld and Birnam Community Council

- Affiliations we are affiliated to the Federation of City Farms and Community Gardens.
- Reflection We had a Trustees meeting devoted to reflecting on 2012
- Business Plan we produced a Business plan for 2013
- Facebook we are on facebook thanks to Sally Small
